Dear Secretary Bessent:

Safeguarding sensitive consumer data is a top goal to protect our national security. We have already seen cases where foreign adversaries such as China have sought to exploit U.S. laws to acquire information that could be used against specific individuals and our national interests.

The recent bankruptcy filing by 23andMe raises questions about potential buyers of its genetic database that contains the information of approximately 15 million customers. Chinese companies have already taken steps to collect genetic data across the world that could be used for adverse purposes. These adversaries may similarly seek to acquire 23 and Me's database and potentially use it against Americans.

The Department of the Treasury, through the Committee on Foreign Investment in the United States (CFIUS), has broad authority to review transactions that may impact the national security of the United States, including those that are part of a bankruptcy proceeding. Last year, Congress specifically raised concerns about entities with ties to the Chinese government seeking to access genetic data.² As 23andMe undergoes bankruptcy proceedings, I encourage you to use all available resources to monitor this process, including a CFIUS review to prevent hostile powers from obtaining millions of Americans' genetic information, as well as work to implement a uniform process to maximize transparency around potential sales of consumer data.
